Assessment	The exam requires the individual construction of a tool or part of one from those presented during the workshop (e.g., communication passport, communication strip or table, change notebook, etc.). At the same time, the student will be required to complete a very short summary sheet, in which they will indicate the fundamental elements of which the tool is composed and the situation for which it was designed, along with its instructions for use.
Evaluation Criteria	Assessment involves a single final grade. The individual activity, presented by each student, will be evaluated based on: - Structure and logical coherence - Relevance, in relation to the situation for which the tool was created - Clarity of presentation, in relation to the completion of the form.
