Contents Summary	The Public and Administrative Law course explores the structure and functioning of the state, the principles of public and administrative law and the multilevel legal system in a European

	context. It focuses on legal sources, fundamental rights, regional autonomy and the role of public administration in promoting efficiency, transparency and sustainability. Special attention is given to innovative approaches to governance and the protection of rights in the economic, social and environmental spheres.

Recommended Prerequisites	<p>Students without a legal background are invited to actively participate in the 'preparatory course' in law, organised at the beginning of the first semester (Prof. Busatta).</p> <p>At the end of the preparatory course, a final test will be administered to assess the students' basic knowledge. This test will have no negative consequences and is intended to help students understand their current level of knowledge and assist them in choosing appropriate courses. If a student fails the test, he/she may consult the lab teacher or professor to identify ways to improve his/her understanding.</p> <p>Students who pass the test with honours may be awarded up to one additional point.</p>
