Contents Summary	M1 - Module M1 "Economics of the Public Sector" introduces the principles of taxation and how governments use taxes to finance services, steer economic behaviour and pursue social objectives—addressing issues of equity, efficiency, incidence, evasion and sustainability. The course examines intended impact and possible unintended implications of key tax instruments on households, firms and the wider economy. It builds quantitative

	<p>and critical thinking skills so students can design, evaluate and communicate evidence based fiscal policies for governments and public administrations.</p> <p>M2 - Module M2 "Behavioral Economics and Public Policy Design" explores key economic issues related to public service design and implementation. Topics include behavioral economics, choice architecture, nudges, and experimental methods in policy design and evaluation. Students will examine the application of these principles in various policy realms. The course includes case studies, team projects, and discussions to enhance students' analytical and problem-solving skills.</p>

Written exam (40%): This 40-minute exam comprises multiple-choice and short review questions (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3). <p>For Non-Attending students:</p> <p>Written exam (100%): This 60-minute exam comprises multiple choice and short review questions and an essay in which students demonstrate their critical thinking (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5).</p>
