Contents Summary	The course conveys fundamentals, specificities, working methods and theories of art – with a focus on exhibition design and curatorial studies – that consider the act of exhibiting not as

	functional to the presentation of a work, but as artistic practice per se.
Course Topics	<p>Exhibiting means developing a sensitivity for specific things and positioning them in spaces so that they can develop their own evidence. Inherent in the word 'exhibit' is not only the meaning 'to exhibit', but also 'to expose' and 'to deliver'. Students will learn to care for their own work and expose it to the interaction with others and the Other. Students will go through this course from the very beginning and learn what it means to produce a professional exhibition: Networking, produce own artworks, curate the works of their peers, Location scouting, exhibition design, writing exhibition texts, doing press work and organizing documentation.</p> <p>Studio Exhibit Spring 2026 investigates the notion of the market as both a tangible site and a virtual construct. Historically conceived as a defined physical setting where agricultural and manufactured goods were traded among vendors on established dates, the market has undergone a profound transformation with the expansion of global commerce. Its meaning has broadened to embrace an ever-diversifying spectrum of products and modalities, unfolding within fluid, indeterminate territories that include digital platforms and non-public spheres. The act of selling inevitably entails a deliberate choreography of display, in which the presentation of goods becomes a strategic operation. The course therefore interrogates exchange and its diapositives of representation as a means of rearticulating the market—not merely as a locus of transaction, but as a dynamic arena of interaction, negotiation, and encounter.</p>

In fact, the success of the final group exhibition depends on the individual and collective promotion, both of the own work and of the group. The tireless development and translation (theoretical and practical) of the Class topics' into own artistic languages is a basic goal of the course. Therefore Attendance, Communication, Engagement and Willingness to share and network in pictorial, written and spoken ways are critical for the Evaluation at the end of the semester.</p> <p>N.B. Contents Summary	The course aims to convey the fundamentals, specificities, working methods and theories of space and installation art.
Course Topics	The possible subjects and possibilities of doing a show are fundamentally unlimited. The idea of exhibiting includes seeking, locating, organizing, commissioning, producing, cataloging, displaying, storing, and maintaining objects that are of interest to a specific thesis. To curate is to care for, to take care of, something. The subject is open, and the alternatives are infinite. We can define the act of exhibiting as a series of deliberate choices to communicate an idea. Exhibiting, thus, can be considered as an artistic practice. During the semester, students will be asked to focus on a specific exhibition, according to their own interests, and design both its content, location, and display. Theoretical lessons and invited guests will give insights and examples of curated exhibitions (historical or extremely contemporary). Practical exercises, collective discussions, individual and group reviews will complete the class hours.

Contents Summary	The course should provide the cultural and practical fundamentals of exhibition design and to accompany students in the conception and implementation of their artistic projects with a focus on the act of displaying as an artistic practice.
Course Topics	During the semester we will discuss how a private artistic practice can be made public, through the analysis of a series of tools, formats and platforms – both physical and digital – that enable people to exhibit their work nowadays. Most notably, a medium-specific and hands-on approach will be adopted during the whole semester, aimed at practically exploring the intersection of different display formats. During the first half of the semester, analysis of relevant case studies and visits to ongoing exhibitions will be a structural part of the module. During the second half of the semester, students will mostly receive support for the realization of their final works.

Contents Summary	The integrated module enriches the didactic offer of the course with theoretical and operational tools that enable students to understand and critically position themselves within the contemporary debate on curatorial practices and forms of art production and presentation.
Course Topics	<p>The module deals with the phenomenon of the exhibition as a means and form of communication, but also as an art form in its own right. Selected exhibitions and institutions are presented and basic texts on the institution "exhibition" are discussed.</p> <p>Furthermore participants will deal with the topic "Art as Research" and is the central question of how artistic practices, artistic thinking and artistic methods can be used to achieve results that meet higher studies standards and still remain a piece of art. Artists work indeed with innovative and experimental methods that generate new insights of society, culture and nature. In this sense, artistic actions have to be understood as "exploratory" or investigative as other research methods.</p> <p>The course is intended as both, a critical discourse on artistic thinking, observing, reflecting and communication with the aim of crossing the existing boundaries between determinism and creativity.</p>
