Contents Summary	<p>The Labour Law course provides students with an in-depth and analytical knowledge of the legal sources and regulatory frameworks that influence labour relations at national, European and comparative levels. Particular attention is given to recent developments in Italian labour law, with a focus on the evolution of the concept of flexibility. Through the analysis of practical cases, students learn to apply legal rules in real-life contexts, while developing the capacity for autonomous reasoning and the mastery of appropriate legal terminology.</p> <p>The course also promotes the learning skills necessary for further</p>

	academic or professional advancement in the field.
Course Topics	<p>The topics covered will be as follows:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) The historical evolution of Italian labour law and the most recent reforms of Italian labour law; 2) The sources of Italian labour law and the role of ILO, EU and ECHR law; 3) Trade union law and industrial relations; 4) Autonomy and subordination; 5) The employment relationship; 6) The essential characteristics of the standard employment relationship; 7) The concept of flexibility and atypical employment contracts; 8) Anti-discrimination law.
