Contents Summary	It is a "characteristic subject" within the study programme, the lecture complements the social science elements of the study programme. It provides a general overview of sociocultural anthropology for communication studies. Course objectives aim to develop students' conceptual and critical tools for carefully analysing intercultural dynamics in our contemporary world. The course also aims to improve student knowledge of academic research and reading
	skills.
Course Topics	As a science of cultures and societies, social and cultural

	anthropology plays a central role in analysing situations that arise from the intersection of different cultural norms, perspectives, practices, styles, values and beliefs. The first part of the lecture introduces the subject and its methodological approach, the second part deepens the anthropological perspective on specific questions concerning processes of interculturality. Epistemology and methods of anthropological research on culture, cultural comparison, cultural change, social structure, religion, ritual, gender, body and body knowledge, globalisation, migration and transnationalism are the focus. Reflection on interculturality from an anthropological perspective permeates all of the lecture's questions. Reading and discussion of texts, presentations and group work take centre stage. The additional texts will be made available during the course.
