Contents Summary	The course examines welfare systems, the actors and processes that shape social policy, and the organisation of social services, while providing an overview of the legal framework governing the protection of children and families. Particular attention is paid to the interaction between public institutions, social services, and the judicial system in promoting rights, protection, and social inclusion.

Contents Summary	This course provides an introduction to welfare systems, their evolution, governance, and contemporary challenges. Students explore the origins of welfare states, comparative welfare models, and key theories of social protection, citizenship, and social rights. The course examines the roles of the state, market, civil society, and social economy organisations in welfare provision, with particular attention to collaborative and multi-level governance. It analyses welfare policy design, service delivery, co-production, community-based approaches, participation, and social innovation. Contemporary transformations, including marketisation, demographic change, migration, digitalisation, and sustainability challenges, are critically discussed. Finally, students learn how to evaluate welfare systems through social impact assessment, equity, accessibility, quality, accountability, and governance frameworks, developing the analytical skills needed to understand future welfare developments.
