Contents Summary	The course Public and Administrative Law explores the structure and functioning of the State, the principles of public and administrative law, and the multilevel legal system in a European



	context. It focuses on legal sources, fundamental rights, regional autonomy, and the role of public administration in promoting efficiency, transparency, and sustainability. Particular attention is given to innovative approaches to governance and to the protection of rights in the economic, social, and environmental spheres.

Recommended Prerequisites	Students without a background in law are encouraged to actively attend the "preparatory course" in law, organized at the beginning of the first semester (prof.ssa Busatta).

	At the end of the preparatory course, a final test will be administered to assess students' basic knowledge. This test will have no negative consequences and is intended to help students understand their current knowledge level and assist them in selecting appropriate courses. If a student does not pass, they can consult with the Laboratory Lecturer or the Professor to identify ways to improve their understanding. Students who pass with distinction may be awarded up to one additional point

Specific Educational Objectives and Learning	Knowledge and understanding
Outcomes	The student will acquire legal knowledge necessary for the training of senior public sector professionals, capable of understanding and managing the dynamics and relationships within public bodies and local, national and supranational administrations. This knowledge is essential to enable students to successfully take part in public competitions. The student will acquire knowledge of organisational models, the business factors involved in the organisation of public enterprises, operating in different sectors (international organisations, central administrations, local authorities, healthcare, public enterprises) and the consequences for the community. The student will also acquire knowledge necessary for developing, managing and evaluating the impact of public projects, and knowledge useful for analysing organisational innovation processes and interpreting current tools and trends relating to personnel management in public companies. Ability to apply knowledge and understanding The student will acquire the ability to: - interpret and apply the main rules on the organisation and operation of public bodies; - use the techniques of legal reasoning in the field of public administration and the public sector, to use the appropriate legal



knowledge gained to concrete legal and organisational events at local, national and supranational level. Autonomy of judgement The student will acquire the ability to ability to select data and use appropriate information to describe a problem concerning the design, implementation and evaluation of public sector projects and policies, aiming at innovation and improvement of processes, products and results. Communication skills The student will acquire the ability to communicate effectively in oral and written form the specialised content of individual disciplines, using different registers according to the target audience and communicative and didactic purposes, and to evaluate the educational effects of his/her communication. Learning skills The student will acquire the ability to: - use information technology autonomously to carry out bibliographical research and investigations and for one's own training and further education; - identify thematic links and establish relationships between different cases and contexts of analysis; - frame a new problem systematically and generate appropriate taxonomies; - develop general models from the phenomena studied. Outcomes (additional info.) Attending students - Mid-term written exam covering the first third of the course programme (multiple choice questions - 30% of the final mark) - Mid-semester oral exam covering the second third of the course
