Contents Summary	The Labour Law course provides students with an in-depth and analytical knowledge of the legal sources and regulatory frameworks that influence labour relations at national, European and comparative levels. Particular attention is given to recent developments in Italian labour law, with a focus on the evolution of the concept of flexibility. Through the analysis of practical cases, students learn to apply legal rules in real-life contexts, while developing the capacity for autonomous reasoning and the mastery of appropriate legal terminology.  The course also promotes the learning skills necessary for further

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	academic or professional advancement in the field.

Assessment	Students attending the course will be evaluated as follows: midterm or final written exam: 80%; active participation in class: 20%. Students not attending the course will be exclusively evaluated based on the final written exam (100%).
Evaluation Criteria	Relevant for the assessment of the written exam: clarity of the answers, mastery of language (knowledge of the legal technical language, and grammatical and logical mastery of language), ability to summarise, evaluate, and establish relationships between topics.
